BUSN657, Crisis Management for the Business Leader, introduces the role of leaders/managers in developing a crisis management plan. Topics include the types of crisis, the importance of developing a crisis management plan and implementing a team, the ways to be prepared crisis, as well what can be learned through a crisis. The course also covers the impact of a crisis on an organization's employees, customers, suppliers, and general public; and managing stress during a crisis.

##### **Course Scope:**

BUSN657 covers several key concepts. In the course, the student will identify potential internal and external crises and provide insight on how business leaders can work to prepare for crises and challenges in the organization. Students will develop a knowledge of the essential role that leaders/managers play before, during, and after moments of crisis to ensure organizational continuity.

### **Communicating on the Discussion**
